
The comfort zone?

David does, however, find himself at home at three former Northern League venues – Cockfield, which has seen better days, Willington, where the seats may have been pinched from the parish hall and, most gloriously, Stanley United's

windswept former hilltop ground. The dugouts are neither here nor there but, like everyone else, David's awestruck by the little house on the prairie which serves as changing room, canteen, pavilion and much else. "There is surely nothing else like it in English football," he says. United, sadly, have now folded, the historic ground presently unused.

The book, hard back and in colour, covers the non-league dugout in all its oft-ramshackle but always innovative glory. The ANL may be too close the bench mark, but it's still worth pulling up a seat for a couple of hours. A treasure.
